- The New Testament book that surpasses all the others in its direct and indirect use of the Old Testament is the anonymous epistle to the Hebrews."
- "The argument of the letter is, in fact, built on four great prophetic utterances from the Old Testament."
 - Psalm 2
 - Psalm 110
 - Jeremiah 31:31-34
 - Psalm 40:7-9
- "The author's primary theme" is the high priesthood of Jesus Christ.
 - A mediator (Job 9:33)
 - Only two options:
 - Argue your case before God
 - Trust Christ to argue your case before God
- The core presentation is in Hebrews 5:1-10:18
 - Introduction: Hebrews 1:1-4
 - Thesis: Hebrews 2:17
 - Conclusion: Hebrews 13:20-21

 - Forgiveness by the New Covenant (10:15-18).

A shadow of good things to come Hebrews 10:1-4

- Good things to come.
 - The world to come (2:5)
 - The High Priest of good things to come (9:11)
 - The powers of the age to come" (6:5).
 - A city that is to come (13:14)
 - The Blessing of Abraham
- A shadow of the good things to come.
 - A shadow
 - Accurate but limited
 - Imperfect but true
 - Multiple sacrifices
 - Temporal cleansing
 - Cannot perfect!
 - Continual sacrifices
 - A reminder of sin

Good things to come Hebrews 10:5-18

- 1. Psalm 40
 - A Psalm of David.
 - thanksgiving for deliverance
 - no thanks to animal sacrifices
 - submission to the will of God
 - personal sacrifice to God
 - A word of Christ
 - Christ's word at His coming into the world.
 - Translation: "a body you have prepared for me."
 - No error or conflict
 - The will of God is the salvation of His people
 - A perfect Sacrifice
- 2. The application of Psalm 40 (Hebrews 10:8-10)
 - The will of God to be accomplished
 - The Old Covenant terminated forever
 - The offering of the body of Jesus Christ
- 3. The conclusion of the matter (Hebrews 10:11-18)
 - Christ seated at the right hand of God
 - Christ awaiting the good things to come
 - Perfection of the saints
 - The New Covenant fulfilled forgiveness forever
