Therefore, since we have so great a cloud of witnesses surrounding us, let us also lay aside every encumbrance and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us,

- Run is the main verb
- Our surroundings
- Our preparation
 - Lay aside encumbrances
 - Lay aside sin
- Our persistence

fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

- Our focus
- Author one who begins or originates (associated with special esteem)
- Perfecter one who brings something to a successful conclusion

Interpretive Challenge

- 1.1 instead of the present joy before him
- 1.2 instead of the prospective joy before him X
- 2.1 for the present joy before him X
- 2.2 for the prospective joy before him

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For consider Him who has endured such hostility by sinners against Himself, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart.

- Consider to reason with careful deliberation
- Jesus endured
- Sinner sometimes has to connotation of outsider
- Christ's example gives us confidence

You have not yet resisted to the point of shedding blood in your striving against sin;

- These believers have not had intense persecution
- These believers have not resisted sin as Christ did

and you have forgotten the exhortation which is addressed to you as sons,

"My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord,

Nor faint when you are reproved by Him;

- Endurance implies difficulty
- Question or statement?
- From Proverbs 3:11
- Discipline should not be despised

For those whom the Lord loves He disciplines,
And He scourges every son whom He receives."

- Discipline motivated by love
- Hebrew parallelism
 - loves/receives
 - disciplines/scourges
- Chiastic structure

It is for discipline that you endure; God deals with you as with sons; for what son is there whom *his* father does not discipline?

- Discipline is to be desired
- We endure to be trained
- God is doing what even human fathers would do

But if you are without discipline, of which all have become partakers, then you are illegitimate children and not sons.

- Either sons or not sons
- Illegitimate without legal rights or status
- Lack of discipline means lack of love

Furthermore, we had earthly fathers to discipline us, and we respected them; shall we not much rather be subject to the Father of spirits, and live?

- Furthermore introduces new argument in a demonstration
- Lesser to the greater argument
- We should respect God for his discipline of us
- Fathers of flesh, Father of spirits

For they disciplined us for a short time as seemed best to them, but He disciplines us for our good, so that we may share His holiness.

- Human discipline is limited and subjective
 - Short time
 - Seemed best vs. good
- God has a better goal for us
- The only holiness is that from God

All discipline for the moment seems not to be joyful, but sorrowful; yet to those who have been trained by it, afterwards it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness.

- Discipline can train us
- Let discipline accomplish its work
- Concludes the race analogy

Therefore, strengthen the hands that are weak and the knees that are feeble,

and make straight paths for your feet, so that the limb which is lame may not be put out of joint, but rather be healed.

- Isaiah 35:3
- Grow spiritually from discipline
- Need to seek healing not further injury
- We can take an active part in our own discipline

Pursue **peace** with all men, and the **sanctification** without which no one will see the Lord.

- Peace with unbelievers
- Holiness cannot be sacrificed for peace
- Holiness is a necessity

See to it **that** no one comes short of the grace of God; **that** no root of bitterness springing up causes trouble, and by it many be defiled;

- While we pursue peace and holiness...
- Bitterness is a great temptation in trials
 - Against God
 - Against others
- Bitterness can spread

that there be no immoral or godless person like Esau, who sold his own birthright for a single meal.

- While we pursue peace and holiness...
- Avoid worldliness
- Esau thought little of the promise passed on to Isaac

For you know that even afterwards, when he desired to inherit the blessing, he was rejected, for he found no place for repentance, though he sought for it with tears.

- Inheritance generally went with the birthright
- Esau's repentance or Isaac's
- "It" can refer to blessing or repentance
