


History

- Philippi had a strong Roman influence
- A poor church
- Apostolic authority is not mentioned (like Thessalonians)
- Written from Rome (praetorian guard, Caesar's household, etc.)
- The last church Paul personally visited before arrest in Jerusalem
- Last letter written to a church
- Overseers and deacons

Introduction Philippians 1:1-6

¹Paul and Timothy, bond-servants of Christ Jesus,

To all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi, including the overseers and deacons: ²Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

³I thank my God in **all** my remembrance of you, ⁴**always** offering prayer with joy in my **every** prayer for you **all**, ⁵in view of your participation in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus.

- Author: Paul
 - Extensive use of "I"
 - Timothy is referred to in the third person
- Recipients: the Saints
 - In Christ Jesus
 - In Philippi
- Thanksgiving leads into prayer
- The work that God has started He will complete

Introduction Philippians 1:7-11

⁷For it is only right for me to feel this way about you all, because I have you in my heart, since both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel, you all are partakers of grace with me. 8For God is my witness, how I long for you all with the affection of Christ Jesus. ⁹And this I pray, that your love may abound still more and more in real knowledge and all discernment, ¹⁰so that you may approve the things that are excellent, in order to be sincere and blameless until the day of Christ; ¹¹having been filled with the fruit of righteousness which comes through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God.

- Prayer for
 - Love
 - Knowledge
 - Discernment
 - Purity
 - Blamelessness
- Purpose of the prayer
 - Approve what is excellent
 - Bring glory to God

The result of Paul's suffering for the gospel Philippians 1:12-16

¹²Now I want you to know, brethren, that my circumstances have turned out for the greater progress of the gospel, ¹³so that my **imprisonment** in *the cause* of Christ has become well known throughout the whole praetorian guard and to everyone else, ¹⁴ and that most of the brethren, trusting in the Lord because of my **imprisonment**, have far more courage to speak the word of God without fear. ¹⁵Some, to be sure, are preaching Christ even from envy and strife, but some also from good will; ¹⁶the latter *do it* out of love, knowing that I am appointed for the defense of the gospel;

- The gospel always advances
- Praetorian guard probably refers to Rome, not Caesarea
- Faithful suffering encourages other believers
- Those preaching Christ
 - Envy, strife, selfish ambition
 - Good will, love, pure motives

The result of Paul's suffering for the gospel Philippians 1:17-20

¹⁷the former proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition rather than from pure motives, thinking to cause me distress in my imprisonment. ¹⁸What then? Only that in every way, whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is proclaimed; and in this I **rejoice**.

Yes, and I will **rejoice**, ¹⁹for I know that this will turn out for my deliverance through your prayers and the provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ, ²⁰according to my earnest expectation and hope, that I will not be put to shame in anything, but *that* with all boldness, Christ will even now, as always, be exalted in my body, whether by life or by death.

- This was a motivation problem, not a doctrine problem
- We should rejoice whenever Christ is accurately proclaimed
- We should have a great desire for Christ to be exalted in our lives

The result of Paul's suffering for the gospel Philippians 1:21-26

²¹For to me, to **live** is Christ and to die is gain. ²²But if *I am* to **live** *on* in the flesh, this *will* mean fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which to choose. ²³But I am hard-pressed from both *directions*, having the desire to depart and be with Christ, for *that* is very much better; ²⁴yet to remain on in the flesh is more necessary for your sake. ²⁵Convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with you all for your progress and joy in the faith, ²⁶so that your proud confidence in me may abound in Christ Jesus through my coming to you again.

- Paul wanted to remain for
 - Their progress in the faith
 - Their joy in the faith
- We need to do whatever we can to help others grow
- We need to deny what is better for us for what is necessary for others

Conduct worthy of the gospel Philippians 1:27-30

²⁷Only conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that whether I come and see you or remain absent, I will hear of you that you are standing firm in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel; ²⁸in no way alarmed by *your* opponents—which is a sign of destruction for them, but of salvation for you, and that *too*, from God. ²⁹For to you it has been granted for Christ's sake, not only to believe in Him, but also to suffer for His sake, ³⁰experiencing the same conflict which you saw in me, and now hear to be in me.

- Conduct worthy of the gospel
 - Standing firm in one spirit
 - With one mind striving together for the faith
 - Not being alarmed by our opponents
- God's grace to us
 - Faith
 - Suffering

- We need to thank God for other believers
- God will finish the work He has started in His saints
- We need to exalt God in our bodies
- To live is Christ and to die is gain
- We have an obligation to the progress of other believers in the faith
- We need to conduct ourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel
