

First temptation Matthew 4:1-4

¹Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. ²And after He had fasted forty days and forty nights, He then became hungry. ³And the tempter came and said to Him, "If You are the Son of God, command that these stones become bread." ⁴But He answered and said, "It is written, 'Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God.""

- Temptations come in a context
 - Wilderness
 - Pinnacle of the temple
 - A very high mountain
- These environments seem to lead to the temptation being easier
- The temptations attack
 - Jesus' humanity: 1, 2
 - Jesus' deity: 3

Second temptation Matthew 4:5-7

⁵Then the devil took Him into the holy city and had Him stand on the pinnacle of the temple, ⁶and said to Him, "If You are the Son of God, throw Yourself down; for it is written,

'He will command His angels concerning You';

and

'On their hands they will bear You up,

So that You will not strike Your foot against a stone."

⁷Jesus said to him, "On the other hand, it is written, 'You shall not put the Lord your God to the test.'"

- The devil misuses Scripture
- Part of the passage is omitted
- God is to be trusted, not tested
- God's promises are not commands

- Omitted: "To guard you in all your ways."
- Psalm 91 is about deliverance
- What does the rest of the psalm say?
 - Deliverance because of love for God
 - Calling on God for help

Third temptation Matthew 4:8-11

⁸Again, the devil took Him to a very high mountain and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world and their glory; ⁹and he said to Him, "All these things I will give You, if You fall down and worship me." ¹⁰Then Jesus said to him, "Go, Satan! For it is written, 'You shall worship the Lord your God, and serve Him only.'" ¹¹Then the devil left Him; and behold, angels came and *began* to minister to Him.

- Expect Satan to not give up
- This is probably the core temptation
- There will be times of refreshing

The temptations

Temptation	Problem	Remedy
1a: If you are the Son of God	Prove you are the Son of God	Be confident in what God has said
1b: Turn stones into bread	Real needs are physical	Recognize God will provide physically and spiritually
2a: If you are the Son of God	Prove you are the Son of God	Be confident in what God has said
2b: Throw yourself off the temple	Turning a promise of God into a command	Don't test God's promises, trust them
3: Worship Satan	No created things is to be worshipped	Worship and serve God alone
