God's Prior Mercies

♦ A message from their fathers (vs. 1-2)

♦ We have heard with our ears from our fathers who saw these things

♦ The Lord delivered us in our day and showed us great mercy

God's sovereignty shown in his special favor (vs. 2-3)
 The heathen drove out... God's people planted (Ex. 23:28)
 The people afflicted and cast out... favor shown and deliverance given

♦ God's might shown in deliverance

- ♦ God's hand cast out the nations
- \diamond God's sword conquered
- Sod's hand saved them

God's Prior Mercies

♦ God's kindness in the present generation (vs. 4-8)

- $\diamond\,$ He has defeated prior foes
- ♦ He has upheld us in His strength
- ♦ He has been our boast and trust

The Lord's Present Affliction

The Lord's affliction of the Nation

- \diamond He has allowed them to be defeated (vs. 9-10)
- ♦ He has allowed them to be slaughtered (vs. 11)
- ♦ He has allowed them to go into slavery (vs. 12)
- ♦ He has allowed them to be covered with shame (vs. 13-16)

♦ The innocence of the Nation

- ♦ We have not forgotten you (vs. 17)
- ♦ We have not turned away from loving you (vs. 18)
- ♦ We have not walked the paths of sin

♦ The conclusion of the Nation: We are oppressed for your sake (vs. 22)

A Prayer of Deliverance

- The Psalmist's prayer to God
 - ♦ Awake and rescue us
 - ♦ Turn your face to us and remember our troubles
 - ♦ Save us for your mercies sake

♦ The prayers of God's people

- ♦ Asa against the Million Ethiopian soldiers (2 Ch. 14:11-13)
- ♦ Hezekiah against Sennacherib (2 Kings 19:15-19)
- ♦ Elisha against the Assyrians (2 Kings 6:17-18)
