- II. The testimony of men of God who have practised using the Word in prayer.
- III. The advantages of using the Bible in prayer:
 - A. It keeps the reading of the Word personal and practical. A. Whyke encouraged his people to read the Word autobiographically,
 - B. It creates the proper heart-attitude for Bible study and for prayer, giving the desire for both. M'Cheyne said that "This is the best way of knowing the meaning of the Bible and of learning to pray." Law said it would St also that your praying will be "according to His will" (I John till our

 - D. It gives praying variety as well as making it specific. Using the excellent Word will lead to prayer about things which we otherwise would not even think about or dare to mention in prayer. If Spargeon.

V. Putting it into practice:

- A. Claim the promises (as is the case in many of the examples above).
