ROMANS

A very significant feature about the book of Romans has to do with Paul's reference to his own people, the Jews, or Israel.

He referred to **the Jew**, or **the Jews**, in the following verses: **1**:16; **2**:9, 10, 17, 28, 29; **3**:1, 9, 29; **9**: 24; **10**:12 – 11 times..

He referred to **Israel**, or to **the Israelite(s)**, only in chapters 9 through 11: **9**:4, 6 (2x), 27 (2x), 31; **10**:1, 19, 21; **11**:1, 2, 7, 25, 26 – 14 times..

Thus, we can see that:

- 1) He mentioned his people, the Jew, or the Jews, eleven times, but only in chapters 1 through 10.
- 2) He mentioned Israel, or the Israelite(s), only fourteen times, but only in chapters 9 through 11. In addition:
- 3) He mentioned the Gentiles in chapters 1 through 16: **1**:13; **2**:9, 10, 14, 24; **3**:9, 29 (2x); **9**:24, 30; **11**:11, 12, 13 (2x), 25; **15**:9 (2x), 10, 11, 12 (2x), 16 (2x), 18, 27: **16**:24 a total of twenty-six times.
- 4) He mentioned the Gentiles as Greeks, or Greek, only three times: 1:14, 16; 10:12.
- 5) At least twice Paul used the words, "the world," to refer to the Gentiles: **11**:12, 15. Therefore, it appears that he had <u>the individual Jew</u> in mind when he used "Jew" or "Jews," but that he had <u>the nation</u> in mind when he spoke of "Israelite" or "Israelites."
